## Why Are We Here, What's Our Purpose?

As an engineer I was taught that *form follows function*. I have found that to be a profound understanding not only in engineering but to be true throughout my life and work. Whether I am working on a machine, trying to determine which branches to prune from my trees, editing computer code, or helping people and groups grow and develop their life, I need to know the purpose of what or with whom I am working if I am to be truly effective.

Many years ago I spoke with the Captain of a US Frigate. He said that when he was out touring his ship he would, when encountering a sailor doing a task, ask the sailor; "Sailor what is your mission?" And then "sailor what is our mission?" If the sailor was unable to answer both questions, without hesitation, the Captain believed he had failed the sailor, not that the sailor had failed. The Captain understood that one of his primary tasks was to ensure that each individual and the crew as a whole knew their purpose. When everyone has a shared ownership of the mission, then the mission steers the ship rather than the individual egos of the people involved in battling for control.

I have taken the Captain's understanding to heart and have found over the course of my work that the first step in any significant venture is actually to take a step back and ponder what is my purpose, and what is our purpose. From that vantage point we can then plan our next steps forward in the pursuit of goals.

For that reason I see discovering our individual and shared purpose as one of the first steps in any transition. The Lenten **Yes!**<sup>3</sup> program is one way for individuals to discover their personal purpose. From my own experience I have discovered that my personal purpose is to be, "helpful, humorous and healing." Manifesting my purpose is life-giving both to me and those around me.

I have also become aware that the experience of stress occurs when we are prevented or unable to manifest our purpose. We often think the lack of time to complete tasks is stressful, when the reality is that time is actually a resource we need to manifest our purpose. From my perspective our purpose is timeless, it is part of the "me" that God knew when I was in my mother's womb. A mission is actually a temporal job or activity that allows me to manifest my timeless purpose. I have one purpose, but I have had many missions throughout the course of my life. When jobs or missions are aligned with my purpose they are life-giving, when they are not aligned I find them stressful.

As a congregation one of our first tasks in this transition is to discover and define our core purpose. You have begun conversations about St. Michael's and we will be engaging in a survey and additional conversation in the coming weeks. The goal of these activities is to create a clear understanding of St. Michael's purpose to guide all of our work and specifically to inform the congregation about what we need in a rector to help us manifest our purpose in North Colorado Springs and the world. When we know the function the form will follow. I look forward to engaging with you in those conversations. Rob+

*In this Lenten study program you will discover your God-given passion and purpose*

**Session 1 Wednesday March 13: Who Blessed Your Existence and What do you Love to Do?**

A blessing is a way of saying an affirming and empowering Yes! to somebody or something. This session explores the nature of blessings and those things that we bless and are blessed by.

**Session 2: Wednesday March 20: Saying Yes! to God**

One of the main reasons people do not, or cannot, say Yes! to God is because the god they imagine saying Yes! to is not perceived as loving or trustworthy. These crazy god's can literally drive your crazy. We will discover how you can say Yes! to the God who is the Source of your existence and life.

*Please Note: this session will run late as it will conclude with Eucharist outside on the patio.*

**Session 3: Wednesday March 27: Saying Yes! to Your Neighbor**

What kind of neighborhood and world would you like to live in? You will explore how you have a unique contribution to make in partnership with others to create a just world to which you can say Yes! and for which the world would be grateful.

**Session 4: Wednesday April 3: Saying Yes! to Yourself**

Saying Yes! to yourself is about manifesting your God-given talents and abilities to the benefit of yourself and the world. You will explore what you deeply value about yourself, what you long for, and what gives you a deep sense of satisfaction and fulfillment as the one whom God created.

**Session 5: Wednesday April 10: Creating a Life of Yes! Next Steps:**

Special attention will be paid to creating goals that are achievable and sustainable and allow you to continue to say Yes! to God, Yes! to your neighbor, and Yes! to yourself.

## Saintly Sidebar

### St. Mark The Evangelist

St. Mark is given the credit for one of the four Gospels. He was a person who traveled with Jesus as one of the 12 during Jesus' life. He is also credited with founding the Church of Alexandria, one of the most important churches in early Christianity.



As one of the Evangelists, Mark is often depicted as a winged lion or with a lion. In fact Mark is sometimes called the lion of the desert, a reference to Mark bringing the gospel to Africa.

Mark is also credited with bringing water to the Last Supper. It was his house where the disciples gathered after Jesus' death when Jesus appeared to those gathered. (All except Thomas.)

Mark was martyred during the reign of Nero by tying a rope around his neck and dragging him through the streets until he died. His body has been continuously venerated since that time. In 823 some of his relics were taken by Venetian merchants who brought them back to Venice. Eventually a very large basilica was built to house them. There remain there to this day. Venice adopted the symbol of the winged lion in honor of having those bones.

Mark is remembered especially on April 25, the anniversary of his death. All Christian faiths recognize him as special because of the Gospel. Lawyers and mariners also appeal to him for intercession.

## **Music Notes: "Psalms, Hymns, and Spiritual Songs"**

### **The Role of Music in the Church, Pt 2**

#### **Music is Integral to Worship**

The selection of hymns, service music, psalm settings, anthems, and opening and closing voluntaries should be based on the lessons of the day within the liturgical season, to set a appropriate tone for the celebration, highlight the design and flow of the liturgy, and offer elements of dignity, joy and beauty. Yet, music must not dominate the liturgy, and music is not always helpful in certain rites and services. Silence is a powerful tool in worship, and musicians are even fond of saying, "The pause is as important as the note!"

#### **Music is Sacramental in Nature**

The sacraments and sacramental rites are outward and visible signs of an inward and spiritual grace. These rites convey a divine grace or blessing. "Sacraments and sacramental actions make Christ present to us, makes us aware of God's presence and action in our lives." *Sacramental* human actions or material objects incarnate spiritual truth and communicate divine grace to us in our everyday lives. Music is sacramental as it makes us aware of God's presence and God's action in our lives. Dignity, beauty, significance and appropriate ceremony have become essential to our worship celebrations, but also God surprises us by manifesting Himself to us through common, ordinary situations. Be open to seeing God in your life and in the life of our Parish, and in particular through our music and worship actions.

#### **Music Expresses Diversity**

The breadth and depth of human experience in our Church are expressed in a wide-ranging diversity of musical styles. Episcopal services may be led by or include a traditional choir with organ, piano, or other instrumental accompaniment; or by a praise band with guitars, bass, drums, and other instruments, along with soloists or vocal groups. The music of the Taizé and Iona communities in France and Scotland have brought new music with simplicity yet richness and sophistication to our special worship moments. Recorded music, even, is able to enhance either special intimate or very dynamic settings. Embrace this diversity, and be glad that we are part of a church that is open to it!


#### VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

### Temporary Halt to Fundraising

As part of a deeper look at St. Mike's financial situation, policies, and practices, the Vestry has been developing a fundraising policy for the church. The point of the policy is to even the playing field with regard to fundraising, deconflict fundraising events, identify items that should properly be funded in the budget process and not have to rely on ad hoc fundraisers, ensure the congregation knows what activity or ministry the monies raised will benefit, and encourage people who conduct fundraisers to communicate with the congregation about how the monies raised were used.

While the process is ongoing, we have placed a temporary moratorium on fundraisers. That has created a little confusion, so here's some clarification.

- The moratorium is temporary
- Although the moratorium precludes fundraising, it does NOT prohibit recouping the cost of hosting an event by asking for donations (as we usually do at the Men's Pancake Supper, for instance), or selling tickets for an event in advance to know how many people are coming and cover costs
- We have floated a draft of the fundraising policy to the ministries who normally engage in fundraising and received their comments; the policy will be finalized and distributed shortly.

### The Caregiver Support Group

This group supports adults within and outside the parish who are caring for loved ones at home, in assisted living, or from a distance. We gather to support one another, to share our stories, our concerns, and our experiences. Meeting dates are the 1st and 3rd Saturday of the month, in the church library at 2PM. Our next meeting date is March 16. We will have only one meeting in April - Saturday, April 6. Because the 3rd Saturday is Holy Saturday there will be no meeting on April 20. 
