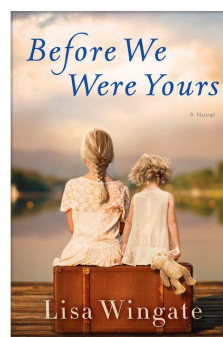

Musings from our Missionary: Emily Darling

Emily Darling is a parishioner of St. Michael's and as a community are supporting Emily as she follows God.

February 6, 2020

Dear St. Michael's,

I have arrived in Kilimatinde, Tanzania! It was a long, arduous journey of travel. It was about twenty five hours of flying time that only included about four and a half hours of layovers. Once I arrived in Dar es Salaam on Monday night, I was picked up at the airport by the manager of St. John's Place, Rev. Canon Lucas Ngassa. It is called St. John's Place because it incorporates three different schools in one, the primary school where I will be volunteering, a seminary school and a Bible college. I arrived in Dar es Salaam at 10:00 pm local time so after getting my VISA and clearing Customs Canon Ngassa and I headed to a hotel to stay the night. The next day at 7:00 am, we boarded a bus to take us on the 10+ hour journey to Kilimatinde. After all that traveling, the lower half of my body was sore.



I have now been in Kilimatinde for over a week and I am learning a lot. I am starting to get the Swahili greetings and I have been offered Swahili lessons with one of the teachers here, her name is Happiness. I am looking forward to being able to communicate easier with those around me as only the diocesan staff and the teachers at the school speak English.

I had about five days to get settled into living in Tanzania before I started teaching. I stayed the night in Manyoni, where the diocese is headquartered, with another volunteer from Germany. Her name is Julia and she is eighteen. Julia came to volunteer for about three months

and she arrived at the beginning of January. I was able to spend the morning with her at the kindergarten that is on the diocesan grounds and started to get a feel for teaching in Tanzania. It was a lot like teaching in the US, but also very different too.

I started teaching at St. John's Primary School on Monday, February 3rd. I have a class of seven Standard II pupils, which is equivalent in age to 2nd grade in the US. I cannot believe that I have my own classroom and pupils, they don't call them students here. It is surreal to me. However, the teacher gene that had been passed down for many generations on both sides of my family is really getting flexed and is manifesting so much joy! Even with only seven it is a lot of work. I am still trying to navigate how and what they teach here. Right now, we are working on capital letters in English and it is really difficult for the kids to grasp. The internet can be a little sketchy with connectivity so I will do my best to post regular updates to my blog. You are welcome to check it out at emilyaggirl.wix.com/forgodsoloved. It never fails to amaze those who attend our meals, that someone they didn't even know, purchased a blanket especially for them! Our turnout for the dinner in December was around 90 people, and thanks to the budget for this meal, we were able to feed them a hearty meal, and had give-away items for them, ranging from washcloth angels on our Christmas Tree, to hats, gloves, and mittens for women and children, to work gloves and liners for men. We gave away a thick pair of acrylic boot socks to every adult, to keep their feet warm and dry, children had gift bags with toys especially chosen for their age, and the adults picked their own gift from a table with Dollar Tree items. Everyone received hot chocolate mix, toiletries, canned ravioli, and other food items as well. Our guests were given a bag with tealight candles to light on Christmas Eve, as a reminder of the gift of Light that came into the world on that night, so many years ago. Pine Creek Student Council was there to prepare and serve the meal and serve our guests in any way that they could. Thank you Carras Callihan and Student Council for the gift of your time and hard work! Music Notes to Enrich our Worship: The Psalms in Worship, Part 1

(Adapted from All Things Necessary: A Practical Guide for Episcopal Church Musicians, and contributed by Rob Carefoot, Organist and Choir Director)

The word psalm is derived from the Greek *psalmos*, literally meaning "the twanging of a harp," and *psallein*, meaning "to pluck, play a stringed instrument"; eventually the word psalm came to mean "a song, a sacred song, or hymn." References to stringed instruments such as the harp and lyre throughout the Psalter indicate that the psalms might have been intended to be accompanied by a stringed instrument.

A psalm is one of 150 Hebrew poems that constitute the Book of Psalms, also known as the Psalter. Information about the Psalter may be found in the BCP on pp. 582-584; the Psalter begins on p. 585.

A History of Psalms in the Church

Psalms are the hymns of the Hebrew people and were included in daily prayers. At Jerusalem, temple worship marked the day liturgically with morning and evening sacrifices and services of psalms and prayers at 9 am and 3 pm. In Jewish tradition, psalms were often sung from the steps in front of the temple, a public performance intended to teach, encourage, and connect with the people. The Levites (the tribe specially dedicated to the priesthood and to music and worship) had the privilege of singing the psalms and playing instruments from the steps of King Solomon's temple.

While many people believe that David wrote almost half of the psalms, there were other authors. The oldest psalms were written by Moses (ca. 1300 B.C.) and include the Song of Moses, a song of triumph after crossing the Red Sea (Exodus 15:1-15), and a song of exhortation in Deuteronomy, chapters 32-33. Moses is also the author of Psalm 90, a song of prayer and reflection. Psalm texts taught moral values, expressed praise and thanksgiving, suffering and lament, and even articulated the coming of the Messiah. As early as the second century, Christians marked the day with morning and evening services. The morning service, imitating the Jewish tradition of psalms and prayers, consisted of psalmody, canticles, prayers, and reading of Scripture. The evening service also included psalmody and prayers, readings, and a blessing of the light, sometimes associated with an agape meal.

The Psalter has been included in every prayer book of the Anglican Communion from 1549 to the current books. Miles Coverdale translated the psalms not from the original Hebrew, but from the Latin translation of the Greek translation from the Hebrew for the Great Bible of 1539-1541. The Psalter of The Book of Common Prayer is in the "spirit of Coverdale" and is a more complete revision of that begun in the 1928 American prayer book.

Psalms are included in almost every rite in The Book of Common Prayer. Psalms have been in use in the services of Holy Eucharist since the fourth century, particularly used at the entrance rite, after readings, offertory, and communion. Some psalms have become central to our worship lives, particularly:

- Psalm 51 on Ash Wednesday: "Have mercy on me, O God..."
- Psalm 22 on Good Friday: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"
- Psalm 23, recited so often at funerals: "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not be in want."
- Psalm 103: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy Name."
- Psalm 121: "I lift up my eyes to the hills, from where is my help to come?"
- Psalm 139: "Lord, you have searched me out and known me; you discern my thoughts from afar."
- Psalm 150: "Hallelujah! Praise God in his holy temple; praise him in the firmament of his power."

The Psalms are particularly effective when recited antiphonally by alternating half-verse. In Part 2 of this series we will examine particular methods or styles of singing and reading the Psalms in public worship.

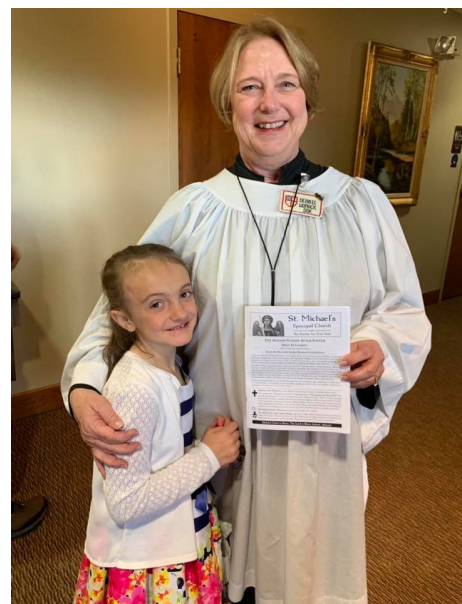
